## ARCHITECT'S

#### BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

ONE of the most satisfactory evidences of social improvement in the present day is to be found in the increased number of Societies, various in their mode of operation, but having in view the same end and object, viz: that of alleviating human misfortune, and of forming some provision against the vicissitudes of human life.

Such a Society, carefully framed and frugally administered, will especially recommend itself to the favour and support of those whom the successful pursuit of their profession has enabled to afford their sympathy and their brotherly assistance to less favoured fellow-labourers in the same field. Even to those whose pecuniary means are moderate, it will be a source of satisfaction to know and feel that by an annual sacrifice, so small as scarcely to be inconvenient to them, they may supply the means of dispensing most valuable and effectual relief.

Literary men, Artists, and many other classes and professions, dependent for their livelihood on profits of uncertain attainment and precarious tenure, have formed themselves into Societies of this nature with the happiest results; but Architecture, the eldest sister of the Fine Arts, has yet to be moved to associate in this good work. She has had the good fortune to be

It is proposed to found the Architect's Benevolent Society on the most liberal basis. Although a preference seems to be due to those who have contributed to the funds of the Society, it is not proposed to incorporate into its regulations any such indispensable condition of assistance. A case of real distress, combined with a fair moral character, is to be the sole

In the mode of administering relief and of enquiring into the merits of each application, no needless exposure of the name or circumstances of the applicant will be permitted. A limited number of Members, forming a Council of Management, chosen by the great body of Subscribers, will be charged with the duty of conducting such enquiries.

The amount and character of the relief to be administered must, of course, depend on the means placed at the disposal of the Society. That such means may be large and liberal, is the earnest hope and sanguine expectation of the promoters of this design, who respectfully solicit the assistance of the profession, and

submit the accompanying Copy of the fundamental Rules which have been proposed for the conduct of

the future Society.

Although it is on the Architectural Profession throughout England that the establishment and success of such a Society must mainly depend, the promoters of it are not without a well-grounded hope that it will find friends in other quarters. Architecture, ancient and modern, has lately attracted a very remarkable degree of attention and interest among the lovers of Art for its own sake, who have prosecuted the study of it, of its history, of its devolopement, and its varied features, with a zeal that has needed not the stimulus of professional emolument. Amongst these too, whom we may claim as intelligent coadjutors in our professional labours, the Society may reasonably expect to find associates in our charitable exertions.

## RULES.

 That the object of the Society be limited strictly to benefit those engaged professionally in all branches connected with Architecture, excluding only such as have in any way been engaged in, or are deriving emolument from, the executive department.

II. Annual Subscribers of One Guinea, or Donors of Ten Guineas in one Donation, to be Members, whether professional or otherwise, and will be entitled to vote and take part in the proceedings at all General Meetings, and in the election of Officers and Council.

III. The President, Treasurer, and Honorary Secretary, to be elected annually by the general body of the Subscribers at the Annual General Meeting, and to be ex-officio Members of the Council.

IV. The Trustees to be elected by the Members of the Society at their first General Meeting, and to be ex-officio Members of the Council.

V. The Council to consist of not more than Fifteen, nor less than Twelve Members, exclusive of the President, Treasurer, Trustees, and Honorary Secretary, and to be elected at the Annual General Meeting, one-third of whom are to go out in rotation, but are eligible for re-election.

VI. The Council to be empowered to appoint the

Assistant Secretary and such other officers as they may find necessary for the efficient working of the Society, and to fix their Salaries and Remunerations.

VII. The Council to enquire into the qualifications and merits of the Applicants for relicf, being guided therein by the Rules and Bye-laws of the Society, and to regulate and control generally the affairs of the Society.

VIII. The qualification of a Candidate for relief shall be the attested fact that he has been duly educated in an Architect's or Surveyor's Office, or that he has produced any valuable invention or any work of art, useful to the profession.

IX. Subscribers to the Society to have in all cases a preferable claim to relief.

X. Two Auditors to be appointed at the Annual General Meeting. A detailed statement of the accounts when audited to be delivered annually to every Member.

XI. An Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the Second Wednesday in March for the purpose of receiving a Report from the Council; for the election of Officers; and for the general purposes of the Society.

## BYE-LAWS

OF THE

# Architect's Benevolent Society.

## Privileges of Members.

- The Members of the Society consist of Benevolent Subscribers, Annual and for Life.
- An Annual Subscriber of one Guinea is entitled to be present and vote at all General Meetings, with the privilege of recommending annually two applicants for relief, and one more for every additional guinea annually subscribed.
- 3. A Donation of Ten Guineas constitutes a Life Member, who is entitled to the same privileges as an Annual Subscriber of One Guinea; a Donor of Twenty Guineas is entitled to recommend four applicants, a Donor of Thirty Guineas six applicants, and so on.
- A Donor of Ten Guineas, or a Donor of Fire Guineas, being also an Annual Subscriber of One Guinea or more, is eligible to become a Member of the Council.
- The Donor of a sum less than a Life Subscription, is, during the year after the payment of such donation, entitled to the same privileges as an Annual Subscriber to the same amount, in recommending

applicants, but not to attend General Meetings, nor to be elected on the Council.

- 6. Any Donor of an amount under Ten Guineas, who has continued an Annual Subscriber to the Society, may, at any time, by adding so much to his previous donation as will, together therewith, amount to Ten Guineas, be considered a Life Member.
- No Subscriber is entitled to any privileges whose subscription is in arrear.

#### Government.

 The Government of the Society is vested in a Council, consisting of a President, not more than fifteen, or less than twelve, Members, the Treasurer, and Trustees, and a Secretary.

## Officers .- The President.

- 9. The President is entitled to take the chair at all meetings of the Society.
- 10. He is entitled to a second or casting-vote upon all occasions where the differing votes are equal in number.
- Council as often as occasion may require; but he shall convene Special General Meetings of the Society only with the concurrence of the Council, or on a requisition signed by not less than ten Subscribers.
- . 12. In the absence of the President any Member of the Council may be elected to the chair by the Members present, and shall be competent to perform the duties of President, and shall in such case have the same privilege of voting.

#### The Council.

- The Council shall consist only of members of the profession.
- 14. A Meeting of the Council shall take place half-yearly, when the recommendations of the applicants for relief shall be considered.
- 15. Other Meetings of the Council may be called as often as the President may consider necessary, five days' notice being sent to each Member by the Secretary.
- 16. In the absence of the President the Secretary shall be competent to call a meeting, on a requisition signed by five Members of the Council.
- 17. In case of the death or resignation of a Member of the Council, or of the Secretary or other officer, the Council may elect a successor, pro tem., from among the Annual or Life Subscribers; but such election shall not render the Member or other officer so elected, ineligible, when the time expires for which he has been so appointed to act.
- 18. Five Members at least must be present to constitute a Council, except on applications for the relief of cases of sudden and urgent distress, when three shall be competent to act.
- 19. The Council are alone empowered to grant relief to applicants, and it will be their duty to select out of the cases recommended such as are the most urgent and the most worthy.
- The Council shall be empowered to remove any paid officer, subject to the approval of a second meeting.

#### The Treasurer.

- 21. All monies received on account of the Society shall be forthwith paid into the hands of the Treasurer.
- 22. He shall be empowered to give receipts for all monies paid to him on account of the Society, for which he shall duly account to the Council.
- 23. All payments on account of the Society shall be made by the Treasurer, by order of the Council, by cheques signed by the Chairman and countersigned by the Treasurer, which cheques shall be the Treasurer's vouchers to the Auditors in passing his accounts.
- 24. He shall invest in Government Securities in the name of the Trustees, all such sums of money as the Council may direct.
- December and the 30th of June in each year, and he shall lay before the Council at the first meeting in January and July a statement of the accounts and of the balance in hand.

#### Banker.

26. A Banker to the Society shall be appointed by the Treasurer and Trustees.

## The Secretary.

- 27. His duties are, to issue natices for all the meetings when duly authorized; such notices to express all the business to be considered.
- 28. To attend all Meetings of the Members and of the Council; to take minutes of their proceedings; and to record the same in proper books prior to the next Meeting.

- 29. To enter in a book copies of all letters issued by the Society, and to preserve such as may be received.
- '30. To keep a register of all applications for relief, and the determination of the Council thereon; also an index to all the books of the Society.
- 31. To take charge of all books and papers belonging to the Society.
- 32. To lay all letters and recommendations received by him on the affairs of the Society, before the Council at the first ensuing Meeting.
- To deliver to each applicant a printed form, containing the laws which regulate applications for relief.
- 84. To present to each half-yearly Meeting of the Council held for distribution, a list of the applicants for relief, stating how often they have been relieved, and every information obtained respecting them.
- 35. To assist the Treasurer in keeping his ac-
- 36. An Assistant Secretary shall be appointed by the Council, who shall give such security as they may require for the faithful performance of his duties; and in the absence of the Secretary the Assistant-Secretary shall be competent to perform the duties of the Secretary, excepting in all matters relative to the Common Seal.

#### Collector.

37. The Collector, previously to entering upon the duties of his office, is to execute a bond (at his own cost) with at least two responsible sureties, jointly

- and severally, or other approved security, in such sum as the Council may require, for the payment of monies collected by him, and the due performance of his duties.
- 38. To use all diligence to obtain Subscriptions; to regularly collect the Subscriptions as they become due; to deliver printed receipts, regularly numbered and signed by himself and the Secretary, for all monies received by him on behalf of the Society, and to keep a counterpart thereof containing all necessary information, and to deliver all reports and other papers as may be directed.
- by him, taking acknowledgements for the same once in a month, or oftener if the cash in his hands amounts to £20.
- 40. To keep a correct list of all the Subscribers, with their payments, residences, &c.
- the same may be posted to the credit of each Donor Subscriber in a cash ledger, containing a debtor and condition account of all monies received.
- 42. To attend and lay before the Council, when attended, his receipt books, with the names of all new Subscribers, also of such as are deceased or have declined to continue their Subscriptions, and an alphabatical list of all the Subscriptions in arrear.

#### Auditors.

43. The Auditors shall examine all accounts of menipts and disbursements, and the state of the pro-

to the first Meeting of the Council in January in each year, in order that a statement thereof may be printed and delivered to each Subscriber.

#### General Meetings.

- 44. A General Meeting of the Subscribers shall be held on the second Wednesday in March in each year.
- 45. Seven Subscribers at least are necessary to constitute a General Meeting, and if that number be not present within one hour after the time appointed, the Subscribers assembled, or a majority of them, may adjourn the Meeting to some other time or place to be by them appointed; an adjournment may also take place after the business has commenced, if the majority shall so determine.
- 46. At every Annual General Meeting the Officers of the Society, viz., the President, Council, Treasurer, Secretary, and Auditors, shall be elected to serve for one year, or until the next General Meeting; and those who have served during the preceding year may be re-elected, excepting the five senior Members of Council, or those who have served for three years, who shall go out of office, and not be re-eligible until the next Annual General Meeting.
- Seven days' notice shall be sent to each Subscriber prior to holding a General Meeting.
- 48. Bye Laws may be made and established, altered, varied, or revoked by a General Meeting; provided that notice thereof, distinctly specifying the purposes intended, be inserted in the summons convening the Meeting, and be recommended by the Council, or by a requisition signed by ten or more Subscribers, and transmitted to the Secretary one month previously;

sad no such enactment, amendment or repeal, shall be walld, until confirmed by another General Meeting, specially convened for that purpose.

- 49. No business transacted at General Meetings shall require confirmation at a subsequent Meeting, excepting as regards Bye Laws as aforesaid.
- Accounts of the Society shall be produced for the Inspection of the Subscribers.

## Special General Meetings.

51. Special General Meetings may be held by order of the Council, or upon Requisition, addressed to the President, signed by ten or more Subscribers, stating the object and business to be proposed, which shall also be inserted in the summons; and no other business shall be transacted at that Meeting.

## Regulations of Meetings.

- Members of Council, who shall have the same privilege in voting as the President.
- 23. At every General Meeting, or Meeting of the Council, previously to all other business, the minutes of the last Meeting shall be read; and if correct, the Chairman shall authenticate them by his signature.
- 55. All motions at General Meetings shall be dilivered to the Chairman in writing, signed by the supper and seconder, and read by him before any debate shall take place thereon.

55. All questions on General Business shall be decided by a majority of votes; but all elections and appointments shall be decided by a ballot, if demanded.

#### Funds.

- 56. The Funds of the Society are divided into two portions, the one part being vested in Government Securities, the other part being immediately applicable to the payment of the necessary disbursements, and the relief of applicants.
- 57. All the Funded Property of the Society shall be invested in the name of the Trustees of the Architects' Benevolent Society, and no sale or transfer thereof shall be made without the order of the Council, under the Common Seal, and signed by the Chairman and Secretary.
- 58. All Donations and Legacies shall be funded until a Fund of £3000 be realized, when the consideration of further Investments shall be brought before the General Meeting of Subscribers, and only the interest upon the funded property, with the Annual Subscriptions, shall be applied to the purposes aforesaid.
- 59. All Annual Subscriptions and Dividends of Stock shall be applied to the payment of the necessary expenses, and the relief of Applicants; reserving a sum not exceeding £ at each half-yearly distribution for the relief of cases of urgent sudden distress.
- 60. The distribution of the Funds for the relief of Applicants shall take place in the months of January and July in each year.

#### The Common Seal.

61. There shall be a Common Seal of the Society

which shall be kept in the custody of the President.

Deeds, Instruments, and Documents relative to the property and concerns of the Society as the Council shall direct. Every such document shall be signed by the Chairman of the Meeting and the Secretary, and shall be duly recorded in the minutes of the proceedings.

# Applicants for Relief.

- 63. The Candidate for relief must be of good moral character, and known to be honourable in his practice; he must have been duly educated in an Architect's or Surveyor's Office, or he must give such evidence as may be satisfactory to the Council of his having produced any valuable invention or work of art useful to the profession.
- 64. Applications for relief must be transmitted to the Secretary or his Assistant on or before the first of June or the first of December, certified by two Subscribers, one of whom shall state his knowledge of the truth of the statement made.
- 55. Relief shall be afforded once only within twelve months to the same Applicant, unless in a very urgent case of sudden distress, occurring after relief has been granted.
- 66. Every Widow must transmit the certificate of her marriage and the burial of her husband. Orphans must produce certificates of the marriage of their parents, and of their own baptisms, or other satisfactory evidence of their identity.
- 67. All sums voted to Applicants must, before payment, be submitted to a second Meeting of the Coun-

cil; except in urgent cases of sudden distress, when the determination of the Council shall be final.

- 68. When relief is to be granted to Applicants at the half-yearly distribution of the Funds, notice of the same shall be inserted in the summons for the Meeting of the Council.
- 69. No Applicant who has embarked in speculations in Trade, or Bills of Exchange, or Transactions inconsistent with his profession, shall be admitted as an applicant.

#### Urgent Cases.

- 70. Urgent Cases entitled to immediate assistance are limited to such as arise from the death of a near relative, sudden illness, distraint of household goods, imprisonment, fire, or other sudden and unavoidable calamities.
- 71. Applications for the relief of Urgent Cases may be made at any time, but they must be certified by four Subscribers, one of them testifying by letter his knowledge of the truth and merits of the case.
- 72. A Special Meeting of the Council shall be held as soon as possible after the application for relief of an urgent case, the name, profession, and residence of the applicant being stated in the notice; at which Meeting Three Members shall be competent to act, and their determination shall be final.
- 73. The Names of the Persons relieved by this Society shall not be made public.

#### Anniversary.

74. An Anniversary Dinner shall be held for the purpose of promoting the interests of the Society, to which the Patrons of the Fine Arts may be invited.

## REPORT

TO THE

GENERAL MEETING, MARCH 12th, 1851.

Ir has now become the duty of the Council of the ARCHITECT'S BENEVOLENT SOCIETY to submit to the general body of Members their First Annual Report: but however interesting the occasion may be, and however agreeable the task, the shortness of the course they have hitherto run renders it necessarily

a light one.

Since the 27th of November last, when the Society commenced its legal existence, the attention of the Council has been chiefly occupied in the preparation Bye-laws for the regulation of the future proceedmon of the Society. It is obvious that much of the being and well-doing of the Society depends on the fitness and propriety of its Bye-laws, and the Someil have, therefore, not failed to give them their to consideration. They have not hesitated freely angual themselves of the experience of other analogous Consisties, but of none so freely as that of the ARTISTS' similar, and whose merits are so undeniable. In thring these Bye-laws before the General Meeting the Council trust that they will be received with indulmace, and that their efficiency may be tested by the of a year's experience, after which period the Council will gladly apply themselves to the correction whatever may have appeared defective.

It is one of the fundamental rules of the Society t a statement of accounts and a balance-sheet shall be annually laid before the Subscribers, showing the state of its funds up to the last day of each year. The Treasurer, therefore, now submits such a statement, and the Council congratulate the Society on being already in such a position, that, after having invested the sum of £300, a fair balance still remains for carrying out the charitable objects of the Society.

By some it has been argued that Societies of this nature have a tendency to promote improvidence and to discourage habits of thrift. It may possibly be true that the more humble portion of the labouring classes may, sometimes, be induced, by the promise of national support, to neglect those habits of carefulness which usually distinguish the better portion of our countrymen; but to suppose that the educated artist and gentleman, for whom this Society is exclusively established, would be led in the slightest degree to relax his efforts to attain an independent position by a reliance on the prospect of eleemosynary aid held out by our Society, would be an imputation upon the professors of a liberal art which certainly they do not descrive. It is, on the contrary, essential to the interests and respectability of our profession that this Society should exist upon a broad and permanent basis, and the Council beg earnestly to remind the Members that a very trifling annual payment from all who are really interested in the bonour and welfare of our profession, would be sufficient to place the Society on such a basis, and would, without appreciable inconvenience to any individual, enable the Society to carry out effectively its charitable objects.

In conclusion, the Council beg most earnestly to plead the cause of this infant Institution; they are most grateful for the large and liberal support that has already been accorded to it, but they trust that it may be regarded as only an earnest of a future, far more extensive, co-operation.
